In all transparency though, there have been those few times where I didn't want to say yes initially, typically because self was trying to creep in, but I still said yes regardless of whether I wanted to or not! In those few times of doing it when I didn't want to, I was always uplifted and grateful that I did it regardless of what my wants were.

2 Drunks and a cup of coffee

I met Sammy 7 years ago when I first came into the rooms. Sammy has this amazing ability to tell me like it is in a loving way. Even though I don't want to hear it, it never seems to sting as much when it comes from her. Sammy taught me early on by her laughter, that there was fun to be had here. I saw that my life wasn't over and that I didn't have to pick up a drink....no matter what! Every time I hear Sammy share, I learn something new. So grab a cup of coffee, open up your mind and get a good dose of experience, strength and hope.

How did you find AA? Actually, AA found me - in a psych unit in Philadelphia. The night I bottomed out, God gave me a little window where I could see the truth, that I was the problem. I was seeing a therapist at the time and asked her to put me away. I didn't know it was alcoholism. Before I went to treatment I prayed that God would either take me or fix me. They told me in treatment that they thought I suffered from alcoholism. At that point I surrendered and did everything they asked me to do. AA came for a commitment and they spoke my language and understood how I felt. I wondered how you got to sit on the other side of the table. I fell in love with AA right then and there. They are my people, they are the only people who understood me.

What's your favorite chapter in the Big Book? The Doctor's Opinion because it explains what's wrong with me. I also like More about alcoholism. It just narrowed it down so simply. It explains how we fill our hole in the soul with all of these unhealthy things and as an alternative, I could seek spiritual help. Now, Bills story, I couldn't relate too at first, but then I learned the FTD philosophy - how often did I <u>F</u>eel like Bill, how often did I <u>T</u>hink like Bill and how often did I <u>D</u>rink like Bill. Once I started sponsoring women, I would ask them the same questions.

What is the first piece of advice you received? The first thing I heard was - Don't think, don't drink and go to a meeting. My first sponsor gave me a lot of great advice. She used to say to me when I would complain - Do you want to be right or do you want to be happy? She would tell me to help someone. I remember saying but I only have 2 weeks, what kind of help can I be? She would say well she may only have 2 days...you always have something to give. They told me in rehab that only 3 of us would make it and I said well find two more cuz I'm taking this seat and not letting go. I loved sobriety and nobody was taking it from me.

What is your favorite slogan? To thine own self be true because it is the hardest one for me to live. I'm such a people pleaser. Saying yes when I want to say no. I can lie to others but to stop lying to myself is hard. The night I bottomed out, I had to be true to myself. Another one I love is Be still and know that I am God. 1 day at a time was the hardest for me...i wanted 5 years in 5 minutes. I was always projecting.


What piece of advice would you give to a new comer? Go all the way in and sit all the way down and help will come. Don't give up before the miracle. Look for the similarities and not the differences.

How has AA changed? I think it has changed and continues to change to keep up with the times. I think that's ok as long as the steps, concepts and traditions don't. I miss the 20/20 club which means we would go to meetings 20 minutes early and stay 20 minutes late. I miss the convention that was so much fun. I also think people rely too heavily on the meetings and fellowship and not on the actual program and the 12 steps. Booze was my solution and now the 12 steps are my solution. I don't hear about many intergroup 12 step calls anymore. A piece of advice - never go on a 12 step call by yourself. I think that As long as AA serves God, it will stay around and as long as I have a Big Book and you have a Big Book, we will always have AA.

Service Position: Intergroup Rep for Sisters In Serenity Length of service commitment: 2 years **Sobriety requirement:** Suggested 1 year of continuous sobriety Service Position Responsibilities: "The purpose of an intergroup rep is to be a link in the chain connecting the individual member of an AA group to those who are elected to maintain the operation of Intergroup." I would attend the monthly Intergroup Representatives meeting. At this meeting I bring any comments, suggestions, or opinions that my Home Group may have. I was able to cast my groups' vote on all matters requiring a group conscious. I was responsible for getting a monthly Institutional Commitment and ensured that the members of my homegroup were filling it and showing up to the commitment. I also gathered flyers of current events going on in the AA community for the month. It was my duty to keep my group informed on the "happenings" in AA. I also attended my Home Groups monthly business meeting where I gave the Intergroup report. This usually consisted of monthly Intergroup budget and financial reports, any new service positions open at the intergroup level, any committees that needed support and any updates from Intergroup.

How has this service commitment changed/enhanced your personal sobriety?

I have been the Intergroup Rep for my homegroup for 2 years. I have met some truly amazing people whose paths I may never have crossed if it weren't for the monthly Intergroup meeting. I originally started the commitment when I had 1 year of sobriety and it's really helped me to stay engaged and in the middle of AA. The responsibility of getting my homegroup an Institutional Commitment and making sure that it was filled every month gave me a sense of purpose. Institutional commitments are so rewarding. Carrying the message by simply sharing my experience enables strength and hope which is such a gift. They also "keep things green" for me and allow me to never forget where I have come from.

My Intergroup rep commitment has given me a glimpse into the things that go on in AA behind the scenes. There are a lot of moving parts that keep AA functioning as a whole that I was completely unaware of before taking on this commitment. Intergroup, Area, District, GSR and the traditions are the glue that holds AA together and as member of AA I feel as though it's my responsibility to know what keeps AA operating successfully. I believe I'm truly a valued member because my opinion is always heard and considered. If you are a member of AA you have a voice and it matters.


How has AA Service changed/enhanced your personal sobriety?

AA service has completely enhanced my sobriety and I can say with complete certainty that this has helped me to stay sober. I struggled in the beginning of my sobriety connecting with other AA members because of my own insecurities. I would come to meetings; I wouldn't open my mouth. I would come late, leave early and as a result I felt like an

outsider looking in. However, service opportunities changed that for me. I was forced to step out of my comfort zone. The first service opportunity that I had was coffee maker. I had to come to the meeting early and leave late. I got the opportunity to communicate and connect with other AA members that I had never spoken to before and most importantly it held me accountable. My first sponsor taught me a valuable lesson, when you commit to something you need to follow through on that commitment because that is an important part of sobriety, "Doing what you say and making sure your actions match your words." My committed to making the coffee so I felt as though I had to be there. I began to connect with others and as a result I started to see that I am not alone and finally felt a part of.

Current & Past Service Positions Held: Numerous Institutional Commitments, Coffee maker/Open meeting, and Intergroup Rep. As a member of AA it is my responsibility to give back what was so freely given to me. It's how AA continues to grow and ultimately what keeps me sober and for that I am truly grateful.
