Sober Holidays

When first given the topic of "Sober Holidays" to ponder I wanted to think of something quite inspirational, a big "a-ha" type moment. As I sat and reflected on my past sober Christmases I realized I have had so many moments along the way. While they may not mean much to others; they mean the world to me. I started to look through my camera roll on my phone to remind me of the many joys each Christmas season of sobriety brought me.

My first sober Christmas, I had just celebrated 4 months and I felt like I had conquered the world. It was a big deal! I know now that every day sober is a huge deal. I went to a meeting at 7am and sat on the floor of Dawn Patrol because it was so crowded. I was filled with absolute joy and gratitude to have found my "people". The following Christmas my sister invited me to sleep at her house on Christmas Eve so I could wake up with them on Christmas morning. I was able to see my 2-year-old nephew bolt down the steps and just stop in his tracks and be awed by what Santa had brought. That same Christmas I held my 6-week-old niece to my chest as her brother opened his gifts. While not always apparent at the time – these were the true gifts of sobriety. I was showing up in a way I never could before. I was not just there physically – I was present mentally and I was aware of every emotion that was happening inside me.

As the years went on, I would continue to have these absolutely magical moments. Moments of seeing Christmas through a child's eyes. Moments of watching my family band together to help my medically fragile dad navigate his first Christmas after a stroke. Moments of being able to wash the dishes with my mom after everyone leaves on Christmas Eve. Moments of being able to wake up on Christmas morning with my partner and just "Be".

As this Christmas approaches, I continue to show up for my family – because I can. I show up now because I want to. Anyone that knows me knows that I love Christmas. I love the décor. I love baking cookies and pizzelles each year. I love showing up. I love being a part of. I love that sobriety has given me a life beyond my wildest dreams. I say that easily because even when life is hard and shows up in a way I do not "prefer", I am reminded that I am never alone in this fellowship. This fellowship has given me beautiful relationships that are real and authentic. Experiencing the joy of the holidays goes beyond the fancy tree. The holidays are a reminder that I get to show up and be a fellow among fellows.

This Christmas I challenge you to find the small moments and cherish them. I will leave you with "When in doubt – take the picture". Being able to scroll through my camera roll and see all my sober Christmas pictures took me right back to each Christmas and the all joys that came with each one.
